What is a Donga, Really?

The term “donga” has been around for decades, apparently from an African word. It came into Aussie slang in mining and construction circles, describing lightweight, portable shelters that could be hauled from site to site.

- **Compact Size:** To fit on older trucks, dongas were narrow (around 2.4m wide) and low (under 3m high).
- **Easy Transportability:** Designed to be moved as quickly as the work itself.
- **Minimal Interiors:** Basic layouts with no insulation or mod-cons.
- **Industrial Look:** Tough and unpolished, prioritising function over form.

They were perfect for the time—when workers didn’t expect much and budgets were tight. But as expectations for comfort, safety, and aesthetics have risen,

dongas have become less relevant.

The Donga vs. Modern Modular Solutions

Today, calling everything a “donga” is like calling all work vehicles “utes.” The term just doesn’t capture the full picture. Modular options have diversified to meet a range of needs, and modern alternatives blow traditional dongas out of the water.

Dongas

- **Features:** Basic interiors, focused on function rather than comfort.
- **Style:** Plain and practical, without modern flourishes.
- **Cost:** Affordable for short-term needs but limited in scope.

Back in the day, workers accepted dongas because they didn't have many alternatives. But in today's competitive labour market, where skilled workers have higher expectations, providing outdated accommodation can send the wrong message.
